This new discovery platform will act as an alternative search engine and curate a refined roll call of the best places to visit in cities around the world, starting in London. There's a barbershop that hosts art exhibitions, an independent cinema that gives to charity and a pizza restaurant that started from the back of a threewheeled truck.


HUCKLE THE BARBER SHOREDITCH

Chris Ward, 33, learned the tricks of the trade as a hairdresser for 15 years but never stopped dreaming about being his own boss. "I always wanted to open my own highend barbershop," he says. "It would offer haircuts, beard trims and wet shaves but would also be about lifestyle - more like a club." That's Huckle the Barber, which doubles as a communal space hosting "bring your own beer" comedy nights and art exhibitions.

PIZZA PILGRIMS SOHO



CARAVAN CLERKENWELL

Miles Kirby was head chef at the Providores restaurant in Marylebone before embarking on his new challenge; Caravan now has restaurants in Exmouth Market and King's Cross. "Everything I had was on the line: my money and my reputation as a chef," says Kirby. "You just have to do or die." He wanted to serve good food and coffee all day long so in addition to creating a delicious menu - avocado on toast and jalapeno cornbread with chipotle butter both feature - he also built a coffee roastery in the basement of the King's Cross site.

STREET FEAST DALSTON

Dominic Cools-Lartique is a true Londoner: "I grew up here, I know the city and I realised that what it needed was a night market I decided it was my mission to make it part of people's everyday lives." After a year of trying and selecting all the best food stalls, he launched Street Feast in 2012. It has settled in an old car park called Dalston Yard and become a unique space to experience everything from lobster roll to whisky
